"Minority Report: A Sociological Account of Muslim Immigrants in Canada"

Debates about Canadian Muslims have focused on theology or culture, treated Muslims as a mo-population, and paid title attention to the specificities of local contexts. As a result, they have oversimplified complex cools relating and offered poor guides to policy. Professor Rezempur overcomes these problems by employing a wide range of socio-economic data to argue for a sociologically grounded account of Muslims in Canadia.

Professor Kazemipur's The Muslim Question in Canada: A Story of Segmented Integration (Vancour University of British Columbia Press, 2014) won the John Porter Prize of the Canadian Sociological Association for the outstanding book in Canadian sociology, 2015. (*Read the first chapter here*)

WEDNESDAY JANUARY 25, 2017: PANEL DISCUSSION ON HIRING BIAS



A panel met on January 25, 2017 at the Munk School of Global Affairs to discuss a new research report or discrimination against job applicants with Asian names in the Canadara workplace.

The report, released that day by researchers Rupa Banerjee, Jeffrey G. Reitz and Phil Orropoulos, was titled "Do Large Employers Treat Racial Minorities More Fairly." It examined dala previously collected by Orepoulos, which recorded employer responses to nearby 13,000 resumes submitted to employers advertising jobs requiring university degrees in Toronto and Montreal, and focused on how an Asian name or the application affected that response. The purpose of the new study was to see how discrimination against Asian-named applicants varied by employer size. Full summary of this event.
