HIGH QUALITY OF GRADUATE STUDENT PAPERS FOR 2020 EVENT

The 13th Annual Ethnic and Pluralism Studies Graduate Research Conference was held on January 30 & 31, 2020, and was noteworthy for the hig quality of the papers presented. 18 presentations, sorted into 5 sessions took place in Room 108N of the Munk School of Global Affairs and Public Policy, Trinfy Sta

This year's student organizing committee was composed of David Howarth and Yu-Chen Chen from CERES, Adiba Hasan and Fatemah Ebrahim from MGA, and Lynda Chubak from the Department of Anthropology. The committee members set the conference program and each chaired one of the sessions during the two-day event.

Each presenter had 15 minutes to give their talk, and at the conclusion of all presentations, the faculty discussant was asked to comment on each paper. The presenters were then given the opportunity to respond to the comments, after which the session chair opened the floor for questions. All five sessions were very well attended, and discussions often continued over funch and coffee breaks.

Faculty discussants were asked to nominate papers for the "Outstanding Conference Paper" awards, and this year's award recipients will be announced in a separate feature.
