SCOT WORTLEY GIVES LECTURE ON RACIAL PROFILING



THE USUAL SUSPECTS: THE CAUSES AND CONSEQUENCES OF RACIAL PROFILING IN CANADA (PAPER AVAILABLE BELOW)

Racial profiling has emerged as one of the most controversial issues within Canadian society. The presentation will begin by reviewing various definitions reads proving has temperate as the or list included in the common state of contact profiling and exploring the root causes of this social phenomenon. On utilitative and quantitative data documenting the extent of roating profiling in Canada will then be explored. The presentation will conclude by reviewing the profound social consequences associated with biased policing practices. It will be argued that profiling not only contributes to the over-representation of racial minorities in the Canadian criminal justice system, it also undermines the legitimacy of the State and contributes to both youth alternation and radicalization. Policy options will be reviewed.



Dr. Wortley is a Professor at the Centre for Criminology and Socio-legal Studies, University of Toronto. He is currently serving as the Centre's Graduate Coordinator and Director of Undergraduate Studies. In 2001 he was appointed the Justice and Law Doarnia Leader at the Centre of Excellence for Research on Immigration and Settlement (CERIS). In 2007, he was appointed by Metropolis to the position of National Priority Leader for research on Justice, Policing and Security. Professor Workley also recently served as the Research Director for two major government inquiries into youth violence in Canada. The Toronto District School Board's School Community Safety Advisory Pranc (Charled by Julian Fatocner) and the Ontario Government's Roots of Youth Violence Inquiry (chaired by Roy McMurtry and Alvin Curling).

Professor Wortley's current research projects include: 1) The Jamaican National Crime Victimization Survey; 2) A study that is investigating the extent and nature of street gangs in Canada; 3) Three shudies that are investigating the effectiveness of various gang prevention programs in the Torroin screen of the properties of the exploring the relationship between immigration and crime using both officials and unofficial sources of crime data; 5) A general population survey of Torroin residents that is examining the direct and collateral consequences of criminal deportation. Professor Wortley has made numerous repentations at international conferences and has given talks to officials at all levels of government. He has also published in various academic journals including the American Journal of Sociology, Social Process.
